Hedgerows

Last month, at Upper School, students from both sites came together to plant hedgerows. With special thanks to our headteacher Ms Gumbrell, and also the involvement of Mrs Thompson and Mr LLoyd who also came to help and support our students. Planting the hedgerows has allowed our school community to work as a team, and also connect as a school through nature. During creating these hedgerows, we shared many laughs, memories and joy! Some of us struggled, but we helped support each other through teamwork. We hope that there will be more future events to work together as a community! We, as a school, were given 120 trees for free from the Woodland Trust.

Mr Lloyd has shared more information on the hedgerow planting:

"These are all native and we've planted them in a hedgerow formation. Hedgerows are essential for rebuilding our lost habitat. Our school is in a unique position to protect the hedgehogs. Enfield is a high risk flood area and we need more trees to absorb ground surface water. This initiative has been led by the head girl team over three successive years of representative partnerships through the generations to tackle climate change. We had representatives from every year of the school who planted the trees of the hedgerow. We planted dogwood, blackthorn, hawthorne, hazel and dogrows along with other species. "

It was an opportunity to have some good practice and preparation for university, as their essays are being marked university style. The students supported each other through engaging excitedly in the sessions, with the tutor and other members of the group creating a comfortable learning environment.

We also had the opportunity to ask one of our Year 13s, Ellie Rumble, about her experience of the Scholars Programme the previous year. The topic was "The Sound of the World, and the World of Sounds," which detailed the cultural and social impact of music. Ellie said that "during the process, it was a lot of hard work, but the pay off was enormous, as it was beneficial for my personal statement and UCAS application." Ellie also said that the programme has boosted her confidence in her subjects, because of the essay skills that she developed.

Ms Cowell said that "the Brilliant club has been a fantastic opportunity for the students to broaden their knowledge of a topic that is outside of their subject areas. It has been an exciting and challenging experience for the students, and undoubtedly will enhance their critical and independent thinking skills. Well done everyone!"


Book of the Month: Half of a Yellow Sun

Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie's Half of a Yellow Sun is a profound exploration of grief, loss, and self-discovery set against the backdrop of the Nigerian Civil War. This literary masterpiece vividly portrays the devastating consequences of the Biafran conflict on its people, unravelling the intertwined lives of its characters with remarkable depth and nuance.
